Participate in local governance and electoral processes to influence decision-making and promote positive change.
	<p>Social inclusion: A community that promotes belonging, acceptance, positive language, acceptance and respect for age diversity.</p>	Model inclusive behaviors, positive language and attitudes in personal interactions and community engagements. Demonstrating respect, empathy, and acceptance towards individuals which may assist with the creation of a culture that is belonging and appreciates age diversity.	Support communities to ensure everyone feels welcome and valued regardless of their background, beliefs, or identities through fostering initiatives that celebrate the diverse cultures, traditions, and identities within the community. Work with community to enhance awareness of ageist language.	Advocating for infrastructure and services that accommodate for the needs of older adults to allow opportunities for engagement and connectivity. Ensuring security, accessibility, and connectedness to enhances vitality. Model a society free from ageist language

By engaging with community assists with the creation of populations that value aging. Elder Abuse – Working Across the Continuum



Primary prevention



Secondary prevention



Tertiary prevention

Preventing abuse *before* it occurs.

Addressing the 'drivers' of elder abuse.

e.g. challenging ageist attitudes and beliefs, addressing misuse of power & control, addressing the impacts of colonisation on First Nations people

Identifying risk factors and Intervening early

Taking precautions and acting early.
e.g. Powers of Attorney, Health Justice Partnerships, mediation, training for professionals to identify elder abuse red flags, activities targeting 'at risk' groups

Intervening *after* abuse has occurred

Services responding to elder abuse that has already occurred.
e.g. Litigation, police, courts, interventions orders

Awareness raising

Awareness raising sits across the prevention continuum, from activities that seek to raise awareness of; the drivers of abuse (primary prevention), risk factors and early intervention strategies (secondary prevention), and activities that raise awareness of what elder abuse is, including elder abuse services and referral pathways (tertiary prevention).

91% was perpetrated by a family member
